Finding

One of the foremost findings of the thesis is that media cultures of princely South Asia

have been relegated to marginalia in the narratives of conventional media

historiography. Taking this premise as a point of departure, it complicates the popular

frameworks in the existing body of scholarship on media and communication, arguing

that much of this academic work imitates what has been called the colonial mode of

historiography. This mode of historiography, it is argued, has the tendency to further

erase media cultures of princely India, thereby posing a serious challenge to many

alternative accounts of media and communication in South Asia.

Secondly, the research finds that journalism research has mostly remained focused on

the genre of news and information. It contrasts the dominant mode of journalism with

literary and political journalism of the late nineteenth and early twentieth century. This

has been achieved by offering a new conceptual framework predicated on notions of

language, discourse and control.

The thesis finds that the long march of press in princely Jammu and Kashmir State has

been riddled with multiple tensions between the state and the press. Raging contestations

on many layers between the two actors continue in the present as well.
