Findings

These innovative strategies were tried out by the researcher in school and in virtual classes. It was found that the interaction and the engagement of the students in the developed innovative teaching-learning activities were up to the mark. Learners were looking self-motivative, curious, and enthusiastic to participate in every activity. These activity-based learning provided a depth understanding of the concepts, as they were answering every question correctly, raised by the researcher.
