The Archives has facilities for complete preservations of the documents including thymol fumigation, brushing, de-acidification, solvent lamination, Chiffon Lamination, full-pasting, docketing and stitching which uses for conservation of records in the Archives.

The staff of Archives is engaged in identifying and collecting material on various literary figures and personalities of historical eminence whose contributions have been important in the making and study of Modern India. See list of repository at serial no. 38 a. They are also responsible for day to day administration of Archives including conservation and preservation, arrangement, cataloguing and publishing of the archival collections housed in his repository. Research assistant is also provided to the scholars by identifying the places and institutions in India where the sources for their research might be available.

51. Detail five major Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Challenges (SWOC) of the Department.

Strength:

- 1. It is the only literary archives in India which collects the record of the leading writers of India.
- 2. It is established within a University where archival records of historical value for research purpose are available.
- 3. It is centrally located in the capital of India with all amenities of access.
- 4. It has trained and qualified staff in record keeping and in the field of literature and history.

Weakness:

Limited funds for the Centre. To enlarge the repository and infrastructure and to conserve/preserve and digitize the collection, funds are required.

Opportunities:

- 1. In an age when we are living in shortage of resource and space. The rich literary heritage of Indian writers is being lost and disintegrated, in this situation this is only Archives for Writers of India and offers the opportunity to build up a vast reservoir of Indian literature in its very primary form to facilitate research and study in the fields of Humanities, Education and Sociology. It is a rare opportunity to cherish and preserve Indian writers, their memory and their contribution in making of modern India. This Writers Archives is its only kind within a University in India.
- 2. The literary collection thus collected in the Archives opens up a whole range of themes for research by scholar in this University and elsewhere.
- 3. It is an opportunity to build a centre of Excellence to support research in the field of literature and humanities.
- 4. It is an opportunity to educate the younger generation. The importance of National

(Literary Heritage) and its preservation and thereby uphold and inculcate a sense of national dignity.

- 5. To bring out a series of publications on different themes from the material collected.
- 6. The Centre promotes a conducive environment for preservation of paper-based heritage.

Challenges:

In a country like India which has 22 official languages and a large number of language dialects, Indian literature one of the richest in the world. To collect a vast repository of literary material of our in different languages and to preserve it for posterity is a mammoth task. Efforts to do make a sizeable collection even in a few languages would be worth the effort

I .Jamia Archives

1. A Permanent Exhibition on Jamia. We propose to set up a permanent exhibition on Jamia which will narrate its story to bring out its unique character that sets it apart from any other university.

Right from its coming into being which has its roots in Gandhi ji's call for Non Co-operation, Its history, its period of transition from Aligarh to Delhi in Karol Bagh, to its present locale. Its tough period of sustenance through sacrifice of its founders, its life- members and its benefactors.

Its growth from a school to a deemed university and its emergence as a central university; and all the following years which saw establishment of various departments and centres;

Its link with the nation and the world at large.

Its Programmes & Initiatives which have been continuously added over the years in keeping with the pace of times.

Its Campus that salutes and celebrates the patriotic, the intellectual & the creative minds and inspires its students with their role model.

- 2. Strengthen the Jamia Archives by Collection and Publication.
- II. Collection & Acquisition of literary material of Creative Writers (authors, poets and journalists) of India.

We propose to collect from leading writers of India their published, unpublished manuscripts, letters, photographs, certificates, Awards/Honours, books written by them or on them, translations of their work, articles on them/by them in newspapers & journals. Their interviews in print or in audio-video, their diaries, mementoes, paintings and select other personal effects which will help researchers study the writers' life and their contribution.

In the first instance efforts will be made to <u>collect primary source material</u> of eminent writers but where ever it is not possible, it is proposed to <u>do a virtual archiving</u> by taking digital prints of manuscripts, letters, photographs and certificates etc.

Listed below are names Indian writers in Urdu, English and Hindi whose be approached, collection will be acquired.

Urdu

- 1. Sir Syed Ahmad Khan & his contemporaries like; Nawab Mohsin-ul-Mulk (Munir Nawaz Jung), Syed Mahmood, the first Muslim High Court Judge, Allama Shibli Nomani, etc.
- 2. Saadat Hasan Manto the iconic story teller, specially of partition of India, and who exposed social ills that mar rich civilizations.
- 3. Rasheed Ahmad Siddiqui noted Urdu writer and distinguished professor at AMU. He was an accomplished essayist and satirist whose impressionistic criticism and lively style of expression has few equals in Urdu literature. A relative of Sir Syed Ahmed Khan and a close friend of Dr. Zakir Husain.
- 4. Jan Nisar Akhtar (1914-1976) the famous lyricist. Like other poets of Progressive Movement his poetry too was secular and advocated human and national dignity. He has collated the best Hindustani poetry of the last 300 years in two volumes.
- 5. Kaifi Azmi (1919-2002) the famous Urdu poet who moved from *ghazals* to socially conscious poetry. His work much applauded for clichés and metaphors.
- 6. Ali Sardar Jafri(1913- 2000) the versatile poet and film lyricist with many awards and Honours
- 7. Sajjad Zahir (1905-1973) a revolutionary Urdu writer and a Marxist thinker. He was the co-founder of 'The Progressive Writers Movement' with Ahmed Ali.
- 8. Rajinder Singh Bedi considered one of the greatest 20th century progressive writers of Urdu fiction, and second most prominent Urdu fiction writer after S. H. Manto and known for his disturbing Partition of India tales.
- 9. Kunwar Mohinder Singh Bedi 'Sahar' His poetry on themes of unity, peace between India and Pakistan and humor is considered to belong to the same transreligious and trans-national tradition as that of Muhammad Iqbal, Faiz Ahmad Faiz and Ahmad Faraz.
- 10. Akhlaq Mohammed Khan 'Shahryar' (Late) an academician and a poet widely acknowledged as the finest exponent of modern Urdu poetry. Recipient of Jnanpith award.
- 11. Rafiq Husain, (Late) -Urdu writer, poet, critic and academician. He was the first Ph.D. holder on Urdu poetry of Allama Iqbal.
- 12. Abul Hasan Ali H. Nadwi (Ali Mian) a historian, Islamic scholar, a founder member of the League of the Islamic Literature in India.
- 13. Shamim Hanafi, Prof. Emeritus, JMI
- 14. Shamsur Rahman Faruqi An expert in classical prosody and the science of poetic discourse, he is known for his contribution to modern literary discourse.
- 15. Naiyar Masud the veteran (and ailing) short story writer based in Lucknow.
- 16. Nida Fazli the popular contemporary poet and lyricist.

17. Gopi Chand Narang – whose extensive research into the hybrid nature and plurality of Urdu language scientifically uncovered its deep links with the Indian psyche and mind resulting in 3 seminal work are considered landmarks in cultural studies.
