The thesis also delves into the intricate relationship between the state and trading communities, highlighting how the state's assistance and incentives fuelled the activities of merchants and influenced the agrarian policy. Lastly, the thesis examines the family, household, and gender dynamics among traders, revealing the evolution of Marwari business houses,

changing caste identities, and the importance of extended kinship networks in supporting economic ventures.

Overall, this research provides a comprehensive understanding of how western Rajasthan's trade evolved, the adaptive strategies of trading communities, and the multifaceted interactions between trade, politics, and society during the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries.
