**Course Description:**

The course will introduce a brief history of Islam and Islamic Civilization, since from evaluation of Islam. The focus in this course will be on history of Islam, development of Islamic Civilization, and its socio-economic and cultural impact.

**Unit One: The world before Islam**

Introduction to the Geographical Overview of Arabian Peninsula; The World Before Islam: The Byzantine and the Sasanian Empires; a brief history Pre-Islamic Arab society Arabia in the 6th century A.D.; Political and religious conditions.

**Unit Two: Rise of Islam**

The emergence of Islam; Prophet's life at Makkah and Madinah.  
Formation of Islamic State at Madinah, the Constitution of Medina.  
Socio – economic and political system of Islam.

**Unit Three: Khilafat – e – Rashidah**

The first four caliphs and the Islamic conquests of the 7th and early 8th centuries.  
Life and achievements of first four Calips.  
Assisment of administration, expansion and consolidation of Islamic State during the Khilafat.  
Social formation and internal conflicts.

**Unit Four: The Umayyad**

Establishment of Umayyad dynasty, expansion and consolidation of the New State System.  
Political Expansions; Administration; Social and Economic Life.  
Society during the Umayyad: Political Changes after the Pious Caliphate.  
Decline of the Umayyad rule and the Abbasid Revolution.
