The National Service Scheme (NSS) is a Central Sector Scheme of Government of India, Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports. It was launched in Jamia Millia Islamia, in the year 1969. Through this scheme, students are provided the opportunity to get the exposure and experience required to be an accomplished social leader, an efficient administrator and a person who understands human nature. This year, similar to the preceding year, owing to the Covid-19 pandemic, all co-curricular activities were conducted online from May 10th to 15th, 2022. Events such as Inter House Solo Song, Ghazal, Fancy Dress competition, lecture on coping with post covid era, Poster-making and Poetry recitation competitions were held throughout the week. The National Service Scheme, under the Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports Government of India, has been in existence in Jamia Millia Islamia ever since its launch in 1969. 

Day 1-Inauguration Function and Lecture on Freedom from Prejudice and Bondage 10th May 2022

The inaugural programme was inaugurated for all the houses, as to introduce all the activities to be conducted in a 7 Day online workshop. The event was hosted by **Ms. Afreen from Ajmal House and Ms Hafsa Khan, and Sheena Parveen**. They welcomed the NSS Officers, Dr. Roohi Fatima & Dr Arif Mohammad, CCA Coordinators Dr Tabassum Naqi & Dr Raisa Khan

and Invited Speakers of the day Dr V. K. Tripathi and Dr. Abid Hussain. The inaugural programme was conducted online on WebEx Platform Dr by Arif Mohammad. All the posted students their attendance in the chat-box of the meeting.



Firstly, **Prof. Farah Farooqui** introduced the program and talked about the importance of CCA and NSS activities in our life. After this, Jamia Tarana was played. **Prof Waqar Hussain**, NSS program coordinator of Jamia Millia Islamia told us about the activities which

are performed during this camp like celebration of National and International days, yearly Mela, departmental fest, different workshops etc. A detailed introduction of NSS in the department was given by **Dr Roohi Fatima**, how it an integral part of the department and how the houses have been named after Jamia's founders' names. She showed us glimpses of NSS Camp and CCA activities which were organized in offline modes before pandemic. She

elaborated the whole period of 7 days of CCA and NSS camp and what type of activities and cultural competitions were held by the students. She concluded by presenting a brief report of last year's NSS & CCA workshop.



Chief Guest of the day Prof Vipin

Kumar Tripathi (Retd.Professor of Physics at IIT) gave a lecture on Freedom from **Prejudice and Bondage**. He talked the power of technology fails without human values and love for humanity. He shared his beautiful experiences regarding power of love, humanity, words, peace, and non-violence. Initially, he discussed two fundamental human concepts that are the basis of all religions and ideologies. First, take responsibility for your actions. If your acts harm others, you should swear to never repeat them. Second, self is servitude. It incapacitates perception and sensibility. Let us concretize freedom - freedom from prejudice, freedom from servitude, and freedom from exploitation - and evaluate the impact of science on freedom. Large machines have a fourfold appetite: iron (for construction), fuel (for operation), raw materials, and markets (for finished products). Imperialism and colonialism began when industrialised nations looked to Asia and Africa to supply their demands and enslaved their inhabitants. The scientists assisted them by creating advanced weaponry and greater machines. When these gadgets, however, enslaved nations, hampered indigenous industries, and caused huge famines (such as the one that killed 14 million people in India in 1898), the learned remained silent, neglecting the fundamental human ideal of accountability. Consequently, education became subordinate to imperialism. Imperialism created sectarianism (a sort of organized prejudice) to maintain its dominance. In some nations, it manifested as fascism and Nazism. The development of smaller machines, such as the power loom, was facilitated by the invention of compact motors, which led to decentralized production.

Many of the world's developing nations are confronted with internal issues such as massive inequality, unemployment, inadequate education, and sectarian bloodshed. People from these

nations who have relocated overseas would do these nations a great favor by rejecting prejudice and belligerence and fostering the development of intermediate technologies. Militancy and firearms play no role. Nonviolence is an ideology that can provide a voice to the public and influence government. Education can contribute in this endeavor.

In the end **Dr Abid Husain Zaidi, NSS Officer, Jamia Millia Islamia** threw some light on the major activities of NSS Camp, being offered by the university and which are very important part of every student's life. NSS motto 'NOT ME, BUT WE' was also elaborated. After this NSS song was also played. **Prof Mehnaz Ansari** expressed her gratitude to Prof Tripathi and gave concluding remarks.




was taken further and **rules for the Solo Song** Competition were mentioned as follows: With this, the competition commenced with the permission of the judges. The first participant

- 2. There will be 1 standby student from each house in respective medium, in case of any network/technical issues.
- 3. Time allotted for each performance is 4-5 minutes.
- 4. Participants will not be allowed to refer to the lyrics while singing.
- 5. Participants are requested to follow a dress code for Lok Geet.
- 6. All the Lok-Geets and Ghazals selected for singing in the competition should be submitted beforehand to avoid repetition.
- 7. All the HRs of houses are requested to submit the names of participants beforehand.
- 8. The choice of Lok-Geet and Ghazal must not hurt any specific community, region, or gender.
- 9. At the time of performances, the participants have to keep their camera and mic on.
- 10. Decision of the judges will be final and binding.

12th May 2022




The Department of Teacher Training and Non-Formal Education (IASE) organized online CCA and NSS Camp for seven days from 10.05.22 to 17.05.22.

Day 4: Lecture on Coping with Post Covid Era (Prof Furqan Qamar) Followed by Yoga

Demonstration

13th May 2002

This session was started by Quran recitation with its meaning, and it was hosted by **Akaknsha Pandey** (**from Ajmal House**), **Hiba Khan, and Km Swalya**. Many faculty members of the department were present, namely, Dr. Tabassum Naqi, Dr. Roohi fatima, Dr. Raisa khan, Prof. Farah Farooqui, and Dr. Shadma Yasmeen.

The lecture series began with the introduction of Prof. Furqan Qamar who is presently Professor of Management at the Centre for Management Studies, Jamia Millia Islamia, New Delhi. He had served as the Secretary General of the Association of Indian Universities (AIU), the largest and one of the oldest networks of universities in the world. In his illustrious career, Dr. Qamar has held the position of the Vice Chancellor of the University of Rajasthan and the Central University of Himachal Pradesh. He has also served as Advisor (Education) in the Planning Commission of India.

The topic of the lecture was on 'Coping with the Post-Covid Era' He started his lecture on how we can overcome the problems posed by the pandemic in the field of Education. He said not only India rather approximately 99 countries have been affected by this Pandemic in the whole world and searching for solutions to cope up with this. He discussed about the question raised on the 'learning process' that whether it will continue or stop after this Pandemic period? He also talked about people adapting and fitting themselves in the new normal world by integrating 'technology' in their teaching-learning process. Prof.Qamar began with the as to how we humans, we share the same suffering, the same aspirations, and the same potential.

The pandemic has served as a reminder of our interdependence: what occurs to one person can quickly influence many others, even on the opposite side of the earth. Therefore, it is up to each of us to strive for mental tranquilly and consider what we may do for others, especially those we will never meet. It is natural to have anxiety and fear when so many people are suffering. But only by cultivating tranquilly and clarity can we aid others and, in doing so, aid ourselves. The current global health crisis reminds us that we must all address issues that affect the human family. Cooperation on a global scale is required to solve this issue, as well as a great number of other issues, especially those impacting the environment. If mankind is to survive, we must ultimately remember that we are one. Historically, the negative mental health effects of disasters have affected more people and lasted significantly longer than the physical health repercussions. As he rightly stated If previous experience is any indication, we should be anticipating a considerable "tail" of mental-health demands to persist long after the outbreak has subsided.

He also highlighted the fact that the extent and duration of Covid-19 has resulted in significant devastation. Grief has become a universal phenomenon in Covid because to the loss of a sense of safety, assurance about the future, jobs, and livelihoods. He spoke about how Grief leadership is essential for communities and entails recognising grief, honouring losses, and encouraging communities to turn to the future with optimism. Numerous individuals are at risk for COVID-19-related mental health complications. He also spoke on the essentiality of conducting health surveillance to better comprehend risk and protective variables, provide effective and focused therapies, and plan for future pandemic waves. Following the emergence of the COVID-19 pandemic, governments across the globe acted swiftly to implement preventative measures such as social separation, quarantine, and isolation. While necessary, these interventions did seem to have a substantial impact on the mental health of young people.

Prof.Qamar spoke about how everyone has dealt with the epidemic in his or her unique way, the pandemic has shown the varied support networks for people and communities. In India, government programmes such as the Public Distribution System (PDS) for distribution of essential supplies, the Integrated Child Development Scheme (ICDS) which provides midday meals to children up to the age of six, and frontline workers such as (Accredited Social Health Activist) ASHA workers, among others, have assisted marginalised communities during these challenging times. At the same time, various holes in these networks have been identified, and civil society organisations have stepped in to fill them and ensure that families have access to the final mile of connectivity. A vast migration of migrant workers from cities to their

respective villages, left without means of subsistence and, in many cases, without a roof over their heads, has brought to light individuals who have had no safety nets to fall back on. At the macro level of policy and governance, we must urgently concentrate on how to improve the current support networks and close the gaps. At the end, he also answered the questions asked by the students.

After the completion of his lecture, **Dr. Roohi Fatima thanked** Prof. Furqan Qamar for giving his precious time and giving wonderful lecture to the students which will be very useful to them.

In the end, **Dr Arif Mohammad**, Assistant Professor at the DTT & NFE (IASE) gave a lecture on the importance of *Yoga in* our lives and also threw light on meaning, scope and nature of Yoga.

Lastly **Prof. Farah Farooqui** concluded the session. with special thanks to Prof. Furqan Qamar.

Day 5: Inter House Poster Making Competition 14th May 2022



15th May 2022


Conducted by - Ansari & Saiyyadain House





Day 7: - Lecture on Role of Social Services in Present Scenario Followed by Valedictory

Program

16th May 2022

The lecture series began with the introduction of **Prof.** (**Dr.**) **Zubair Meenai**, **Faculty**, **Department of Social Work and Director**, **CECDR-JMI**.

He discussed the role of social services, its impact on society, and its own role in the pandemic. He informed the audience as to how social professionals have had to adjust rapidly and extensively to the health, social, and economic components of the Covid-19 crisis. In India, local panchayat, health and social care trusts, and other employing and leading institutions shape social work, with some central government direction. Social workers are vital. Covid-19 showed gaps in national pandemic preparedness and understanding of social workers' role and duties in a disaster. We may learn from this to increase social workers' roles in public health, disaster, and emergency preparation. Social workers are and will continue to play a vital role in responding to the COVID-19 pandemic through direct assistance, continuity of care, and meeting new demands and expectations. Primary duties include reducing infection risks and related damages and managing the social and economic effects of emergency measures including 'lockdown,' shielding, school and company closures, home working, and harsh travel restrictions. At this point in the pandemic, we can recognise and reflect on the role of social workers in the first "phase" of the crisis (since March 2020) and look forward to their role in future stages. This view is informed by international facts and experiences of social work in

disasters and emergencies and by previous work in India on the role of social workers in crisis aftermath and recovery.

Prof. Zubair Meenai argued that the role of social workers in the pandemic and its aftermath (and in subsequent disaster planning) should be better recognised and supported at the national level, while social workers remain empowered to support local communities, families, and individuals they know well. Social workers are vital to local emergency response systems and

should be adequately supported. Social work emphasises human right which are central to social workers' ethics and mission. Crisis is no exception. In uncertain times, universal human rights must be upheld.

The pandemic revealed disparities in human rights



protection and impact across the country. Pandemic pressures and response challenges threaten eroding entitlements, limiting rights, and removing safeguards. Inequality in access to protection from abuse and neglect, life-sustaining treatment, and death rates are starkest examples. He further emphasised that social workers must be integrated into local and community disaster planning to use their knowledge effectively (e.g. local authority, health and social trusts, or wider, interagency health and care system). Social workers use their expertise as individuals and to facilitate and coordinate emergency care delivery. Social workers offer crucial statutory expertise and powers to local interagency emergency plans, maintaining rights and protecting from harm through safeguarding children and adults, conducting Mental Health Act assessments, and fighting domestic violence.

All of this is done with an ethical focus to maximise people's empowerment, allowing choice, control, and co-production even under pressure.

In multiagency emergency response systems, they can focus on the quality and accessibility of social care and social work services. They must continue assessing and overseeing quality of provider care and risk issues for persons (of all ages) in care and assisted living institutions and other "placements." They must also continue reviewing home care, direct payments, and

personal assistants for quality. During Covid-19, social workers may need to restore services rapidly and safely. They advocate for, identify, and support the most disadvantaged, overcoming communication barriers and using advanced relationship-building skills to work with affected individuals and families (including sharing difficult news), signposting, and enabling and supporting individuals, families, and communities in coping with difficult traumatic circumstances. Social workers are key to community sustainability during the emergency's early stages and will participate in the recovery response. Recovery and restoration phases of the epidemic will require close community involvement.



He lauded the virtues of values such as empathy, kindness, and even a helping hand demonstrated during this pandemic. Our preferred weapon should be connecting people with services—homeless people with government-provided provisions, people with special needs with government-provided provisions, and so on.

He concluded his lecture by urging the audience to embrace the spirit of social service in order to help the world overcome this pandemic stronger than ever. This was followed by a feedback session wherein the students spoke of their experiences during the whole duration of the CCA-NSS Camp and how it has taught them the spirit of humility, Cooperation, coordination, and Teamwork.

In this lecture he addressed the condition of present situations after Covid-19 pandemic and how we can combat the aftermath of Covid-19 by using social service as a medium. He also spoke on ways of social service and why it is required in present scenario.

After his enriching lecture **Prof. Gurjeet Kaur** gave her remarks on his lecture in a concise manner. Students' queries were also answers which were posted in the chatbox. A concise but



comprehensive report of 7 days NSS & CCA Workshop was presented by **Dr Arif Mohammad,** NSS Officer of the department.

Very interestingly and surprisingly, many students and HRs from many houses like Harshdeep, Naila, Akshat, Taroo etc. shared *their views and feelings about this NSS & CCA Workshop* which proved to be very enriching for them in terms of learning cooperation, teamwork, competitions, organising and hosting events, hard work and dedication. They shared Jamia's ethos is imbibed in these activities. Everybody was happy to hear them which actually gave words to everyone's feelings out there.

After this **Prof. Naheed Zahoor** gave her *concluding remarks* that the purpose of CCA and NSS activities is being accomplished even in online mode. She congratulated students for their participation and wished them good luck for next day's wall magazine competition to be held on 17.05.2022.
