The Department of Foreign Languages offers a four year B.A. (Hons) Programme in Korean Language and Korean Studies.

Objectives of the Programme

In an increasingly interconnected world, the ability to communicate effectively in Korean and understand Korean culture holds significant value in global affairs, trade, and academia. With the global rise of Hallyu (the Korean Wave)-driven by the popularity of K-pop, K-dramas, and Korean cinema-alongside growing investment by Korean companies in Indian and international markets, Korean has rapidly become one of the most sought-after foreign languages worldwide.

The objective of the B.A. (Hons.) Programme in Korean Language and Korean Studies at Jamia Millia Islamia is to provide students with a solid foundation in the Korean language, combined with a comprehensive understanding of Korea's society, history, and literature. This interdisciplinary training is designed to enhance students' linguistic proficiency, intercultural competence, and career readiness-whether they aim to pursue advanced studies, teaching, translation, or international careers.

Relevance of the Programme

Graduates of this programme will be well-prepared to work and contribute in a range of professional domains. The programme aims to develop individuals who are equipped to become:

Course Code: BLK-C-101 Course Title: Listening Comprehension and Oral Expression - I Hours of Instruction: 4 hours per week Credits: 4

Course Description: This course introduces students to the fundamentals of Korean listening and speaking. Emphasis is placed on understanding and participating in simple conversations on familiar topics such as greetings, self-introduction, days of the week, months, numbers, family, and hobbies. Students will listen to Korean audio materials and learn to respond with basic expressions in formal settings.

By the end of the course, students are expected to reach Level 1 of Korean.

Evaluation: A candidate's performance will be assessed on 100 marks as follows:

a. Internal Assessment (25 marks): There will be three sessional tests of equal weightage – two best to be counted.

b. End semester Examination (75 marks): There will be an oral exam on oral expression and listening comprehension.

Course- 2

Course Code: BLK-C-102

Course Title: Reading Comprehension, Writing Skills and Contextual Grammar - I Hours of Instruction: 4 hours per week Credits: 4

Course Description: This introductory course is designed for learners with little to no background in Korean. Students will develop foundational grammar skills and build reading comprehension through simple texts. Key topics include basic sentence structure, verb conjugations, particles, and essential grammar patterns. Short stories, dialogues, and everyday passages will help students practice reading and understanding Korean in context. By the end of the course, students will be able to read and comprehend beginner-level texts and express themselves using accurate basic grammar.

Evaluation: A candidate's performance will be assessed on 100 marks as follows:

a. **Internal Assessment (25 marks):** There will be three sessional tests of equal weightage – two best to be counted.

b. End semester Examination (75 marks): There will be a written exam on grammar and text comprehension.

Course-3

Course Code: BLK-C-201 Course Title: Listening Comprehension and Oral Expression -II Hours of Instruction: 4 hours per week Credits: 4

Students will be exposed to common expressions and simple dialogues related to daily routine, travel, shopping, weather, and public services,. Practice will include short role-plays and conversations in structured contexts, enhancing pronunciation, intonation, and fluency.

Upon completion, students are expected to reach TOPIK Korean Level 2, enabling them to understand and engage in simple routine tasks requiring direct exchange of information.

Evaluation: A candidate's performance will be assessed on 100 marks as follows:

a. Internal Assessment (25 marks): There will be three sessional tests of equal weightage – two best to be counted.

b. End semester Examination (75 marks): There will be an oral exam on oral expression and listening comprehension.

Course - 4

Course Code: BLK-C-202

Course Title: Reading Comprehension, Writing Skills and Contextual Grammar - II Hours of Instruction: 4 hours per week

Credits: 4

Course Description: This course is designed for learners who have a basic foundation in Korean and are ready to expand their grammar and reading skills. Students will learn more complex sentence patterns, polite and informal verb endings, and essential connectors used in everyday conversation and writing. Reading materials include short narratives, dialogues, and cultural texts that reinforce grammar points and introduce new vocabulary. By the end of the course, students will be able to read and understand longer beginner-level texts and express ideas using a wider range of sentence structures.

Evaluation: A candidate's performance will be assessed on 100 marks as follows:

a. Internal Assessment (25 marks): There will be three sessional tests of equal weightage – two best to be counted. Dates for the internal assessment would be announced with sufficient notice.

b. End semester Examination (75 marks): There will be a written exam on grammar and text comprehension.

Course- 5

Course Code: BLK-C-301 Course Title: Listening Comprehension and Oral Expression -III Hours of Instruction: 4 hours per week Credits: 4

Course Description: This course will focus on enhancing the ability to understand and participate in conversations related to everyday life, social interactions, and some work- or study-related situations.Students will be exposed to a range of **intermediate-level spoken Korean**, including semi-formal dialogues, announcements, interviews, and short discussions. Listening practice will help learners grasp the main points and supporting details even when speech includes less familiar vocabulary or complex sentence structures.

Oral expression activities will emphasize:

- 1. Describing experiences, events, and plans in detail.
- 2. Asking for and giving advice or opinions.
- 3. Participating in structured conversations and short group discussions.

By the end of the course, students will be able to comprehend spoken Korean in a variety of familiar contexts at a natural speaking pace. Engage in conversations with increasing fluency and grammatical accuracy.Communicate effectively in predictable social and practical situations, such as making appointments, discussing daily life, or expressing preferences.

This course prepares students to meet the requirements of TOPIK Korean Level 3, demonstrating the ability to handle a range of everyday interactions and simple work- or study-related communication tasks.

Course Code: BLKH-302

Course Title: Reading Comprehension, Writing Skills and Contextual Grammar -III &Hanja -I

Hours of Instruction: 4 hours per week

Credits: 4

Course Description: This course is designed for learners who have a solid foundation in Korean and are ready to deepen their understanding of Korean grammar and basic Hanja characters and enhance reading proficiency. Emphasis is placed on complex sentence structures, connective expressions, honorifics, and nuanced grammar patterns. Students will read and analyze a variety of authentic texts, including short essays, dialogues, and cultural readings, to build vocabulary, improve comprehension, and strengthen grammatical accuracy. By the end of the course, students will be able to read intermediate-level texts with greater fluency and express themselves more precisely in written and spoken Korean. On completion of the course, students are expected to reach TOPIK Korean level 3.

Evaluation: A candidate's performance will be assessed on 100 marks as follows:

a. **Internal Assessment (25 marks):** There will be three sessional tests of equal weightage – two best to be counted.

b. End semester Examination (75 marks): There will be a written exam on Hanja text,Grammar and Reading comprehension.

Students will engage with audio materials such as news reports, interviews, lectures, and dialogues featuring natural speech patterns, including idiomatic expressions and regional variations.

By the end of the course, students will be able toCommunicate effectively and appropriately in most everyday and professional situations.

This course supports students in achieving **TOPIK Level 4**, which indicates sufficient proficiency for university coursework and formal and Informal communication in Korean.

Course Code: BLKH-403 Course Title:Hanja II & Vocabulary I Hours of Instruction: 4 hours per week Credits: 4

Course Description: This course will focus on vocabulary skills and develop reading comprehension through **Hanja (Chinese characters used in Korean)**. Aligned with the **TOPIK Level 4**, proficiency level, the course focuses on enhancing students' understanding of common Hanja-based words and core vocabulary essential for everyday communication and short reading texts.Students will learn to recognize, read, and write approximately **150–200 high-frequency Hanja characters** and expand their vocabulary by mastering **800–1,000 words.** Through real-life examples, contextual usage, and practice with short reading texts and dialogues.

By the end of the course, students will be able to identify and use common Hanja in everyday vocabulary. Understand word roots and structure to improve vocabulary retention. Comprehend basic public signs, forms, and simple reading passages.

Evaluation: A candidate's performance will be assessed on 100 marks as follows:

a. Internal Assessment (25 marks): There will be three sessional tests of equal weightage – two best to be counted.

b. End semester Examination (75 marks): There will be a written exam on Hanja and Vocabulary

Course Code: BLKH-402

Course Title: Reading Comprehension, Writing Skills and Contextual Grammar -IV Hours of Instruction: 4 hours per week

Course Description: This advanced-level course focuses on enhancing learners' command of Korean grammar and reading comprehension through in-depth analysis of newspaper articles and media texts from diverse fields, including politics, economics, culture, and technology. Students will refine their understanding of complex grammar structures, formal expressions, and topic-specific vocabulary. Emphasis is placed on critical reading, summarizing, and discussing current issues in Korean. By the end of the course, students will be able to interpret advanced written texts with accuracy, recognize nuanced meanings, and engage in informed discussion on contemporary topics. On completion of the course, students are expected to reach TOPIK level 4.

Evaluation: A candidate's performance will be assessed on 100 marks as follows:

a. Internal Assessment (25 marks): There will be three sessional tests of equal weightage – two best to be counted.

b. End semester Examination (75 marks): There will be a written exam on Hanja text translation and news article comprehension.

Course Code: BLKH-501

Course Title: Consecutive Interpretation-I

Hours of Instruction: 4 Hours per week

Credits: 4

Course Description: This course introduces students to the essential concepts and skills of consecutive interpreting. Emphasis is placed on developing core abilities such as active listening, memory retention, comprehension, and speech analysis. Students learn to recognize and organize ideas within a speech, practice paraphrasing, and develop effective note-taking techniques that focus on capturing ideas rather than individual words. The course also covers ethical principles and interpreting etiquette, preparing students to understand the role and responsibilities of a consecutive interpreter. Practical exercises include short fragment interpretation without notes, progressing to note-assisted interpretation of longer texts. This course suits beginners, interpreting students preparing for entrance exams, and translators interested in conference interpreting techniques.

By the end of the course, students are expected to do beginner to intermediate level of consecutive interpretation.

Evaluation: Student's performance will be assessed on 100 marks as follows:

a. Internal Assessment (25 marks): There will be three sessional tests (Oral and Written) of equal weightage and among three best one will be counted for Internal assessment.

b. End Semester Examination (75 marks): There will be an oral exam on consecutive interpretation-I

Students will study commonly used Hanja characters, their meanings, compounds, and usage in modern Korean texts, including academic, journalistic, and official documents. Emphasis will be placed on pragmatic translation strategies, focusing on context-appropriate rendering rather than literal translation. Through hands-on exercises, students will build confidence in interpreting Hanja-based vocabulary and producing accurate, culturally sensitive translations between Korean and their native language.

Evaluation: A candidate's performance will be assessed on 100 marks as follows:

a. Internal Assessment (25 marks): There will be three sessional tests of equal weightage – two best to be counted.

b. End semester Examination (75 marks): There will be a written exam on Hanja text translation and news article comprehension.

Students engage in extensive practice with longer and more challenging speeches, including specialized settings such as legal depositions and healthcare encounters. The course covers professional standards, certification processes, and ethical dilemmas faced by interpreters. It also introduces techniques for transitioning between consecutive and simultaneous interpretation modes. Practical components include simulations of real-world interpreting scenarios, research on the profession, and service-learning opportunities to gain hands-on experience. This course prepares students to operate confidently as professional consecutive interpreters across diverse fields.

By the end of the course, students are expected to do intermediate to advance level of consecutive interpretation.

Evaluation: Student's performance will be assessed on 100 marks as follows:

a. Internal Assessment (25 marks): There will be three sessional tests (Oral and Written) of equal weightage and among three best one will be counted for Internal assessment.

b. End Semester Examination (75 marks): There will be an oral exam on consecutive interpretation-I

Students will engage with classical and modern Hanja expressions found in legal, historical, academic, and journalistic writing. Emphasis is placed on nuanced meaning, intertextual references, register variation, and culturally informed translation strategies. Through intensive practice and case-based analysis, students will gain proficiency in decoding dense Hanja texts and delivering accurate, pragmatic translations across various specialized domains.

Evaluation: A candidate's performance will be assessed on 100 marks as follows:

a. Internal Assessment (25 marks): There will be three sessional tests of equal weightage – two best to be counted. Dates for the internal assessment would be announced with sufficient notice.

b. End semester Examination (75 marks): There will be a written exam on Advanced Hanja text translation and news article comprehension.

Course Description: This course offers a comprehensive introduction to Korean history and culture from the Proto three kingdoms Period to the end of the Chosŏn Dynasty (1392–1910). The focus is on the formation of Korean national identity, Confucian transformation of society, class structure, intellectual life, and cultural practices. Through lectures and primary texts, students will explore how Korea developed unique institutions and traditions while interacting with neighboring East Asian powers.

By the end of this course, students will be able to identify and describe key periods and events in Korean history up to 1910.

Evaluation: A candidate's performance will be assessed on 100 marks as follows:

a. Internal Assessment (25 marks): There will be three sessional tests of equal weightage – two best to be counted.

b. End semester Examination (75 marks) : There will be a written exam on history and culture of Korea

Emphasis is placed on expanding vocabulary, improving listening and speaking skills, and understanding informal and colloquial Korean expressions as used in pop culture contexts. Cultural analysis of media content will provide insight into modern Korean values, trends, and everyday life.

By the end of the course, students will be able to analyze cultural content and its reflection of Korean society

Evaluation: A candidate's performance will be assessed on 100 marks as follows:

a. **Internal Assessment (25 marks):** There will be three sessional tests of equal weightage – two best to be counted.

b. End semester Examination (75 marks): Written exam.

Course Code: BLKH-704 Course Title: History and Culture of Korea-II Hours of Instruction: 4 hours per week Credits: 4

Course Description: This course examines the major historical and cultural transformations in Korea from the Japanese colonial period (1910–1945) to the contemporary era (1945– present). Topics include the colonial experience, national liberation, the Korean War, division of the peninsula, authoritarianism, democratization, gender issues, and the development of popular culture in both South and North Korea. The course uses historical texts, documentaries, and cultural materials to investigate how modern Korea has been shaped.

By the end of this course, students will be able to explain the impact of Japanese colonial rule on Korean politics, society, and culture and analyze the causes and consequences of Korea's national division.

Evaluation: A candidate's performance will be assessed on 100 marks as follows:

a. Internal Assessment (25 marks): There will be three sessional tests of equal weightage – two best to be counted.

b. End semester Examination (75 marks) : There will be a written exam on history and culture of Korea

Course - 21

Course Title: Methodology of teaching Korean as a Foreign Language

Hours of Instruction: 4 Hours per week

Credits: 4

Course Description: The objective of this course is to inculcate the ability to teach Korean as a foreign language to Indians or foreigners. Thus, different approaches and theories related to Korean language education shall be introduced with special focus on present trends and genres in the field of foreign language teaching. The course content will include lectures and practical training in these areas: Fundamental and Theories in teaching Korean language for foreigners, Policy of teaching Korean language, Contrastive analysis of teaching Korean language, Designing curriculum in teaching Korean language, Evolution methods and techniques of Korean language, Methods of research in teaching Korean language.

By the end of the course students are expected to have the knowledge of teaching Korean as a foreign language to the Indian learners.

Evaluation: Student's performance will be assessed on 100 marks as follows:

a. Internal Assessment (25 marks): There will be three sessional tests of equal weightage and among three best one will be counted for Internal assessment.

b. End Semester Examination (75 marks): There will be a written exam on methodology of teaching Korean as a foreign language.

Course Title: Korean Language Through Folklore and Storytelling Hours of Instruction: 4 hours per week Credits: 4

Course Title: Themes in Korean Literature: Past and Present

Hours of Instruction: 4 hours per week

Credits: 4

Course Description:This course offers an in-depth exploration of major themes in Korean literature across historical periods, from classical oral poetry and Confucian prose to colonial resistance fiction, postwar literature, and contemporary narrative forms. This course focuses on the history of ancient and modern Korean literature. Students will engage with recurring literary motifs such as loyalty, exile, identity, trauma, modernity, and gender, analyzing how these have evolved in response to Korea's shifting historical and cultural landscapes. Through close reading and discussion of key texts by influential authors including Hyun Jin- Geon, Choi Seo-Hae, Kim Man-jung, Yi Kwang-su, Hwang Sun-won, Ch'oe Yun, and Han Kang, students will deepen their fluency and interpretive skills while gaining insight into the stylistic and ideological transformations in Korean literary history. Particular attention will be given to the development of Korean literary criticism and postwar theoretical frameworks. The course incorporates readings in Korean literary criticism and encourages students to apply critical approaches to their own analyses.

Evaluation: A candidate's performance will be assessed on 100 marks as follows:

a. Internal Assessment (25 marks): There will be three sessional tests of equal weightage – two best to be counted.

b. End semester Examination (75 marks): Written exam.
